n the 1970's, fraternal life was the main social activity at Gettysburg College. With 80% of men pledging fraternities the same year, **Alan Fuerstman** '78 knew Sigma Chi was the right choice for him. It was not only about the camaraderie, but also the diversity and sense of community.

Alan enjoyed many things about being a part of the brotherhood, and pledge week was especially memorable. He also enjoyed spending time with his brothers at the annual beach party and participating in intramural sports and Derby Days.

What really stood out for Alan was the opportunity to do great things. As all Sigma Chi brothers aspire to achieve greatness, that is exactly what Alan strove for as well.

Alan is the founder, chairman, and CEO of Montage International. Hotels have always been a part of who he is. He started his hospitality career as a doorman his senior year of high school and worked summers during college as a bellman. After college, he started as a bell captain and worked his way up through every department. He learned the ropes and proceeded to run some of the world's greatest hotels, such as The Phoenician resort in Arizona and Bellagio in Las Vegas.

Being in the hospitality business has been very rewarding for Alan; some of his favorite parts have been launching Montage Laguna Beach and creating Pendry Hotels and Resorts with his son, Michael. He is honored that his hotels have received tremendous recognition, such as Montage being the only North America brand to have all its hotels rated five stars by Forbes.

It all comes back to Sigma Chi—Theta Chapter has always been a key player in his success. "I look back fondly at my college years, and Sigma Chi was a large part of that," Alan said. "Friendships made, experiences shared, and living closely with a group of men from different backgrounds with different perspectives helped shape my thinking and contributed to my personal growth."

With many accomplishments under Alan's belt, he is pleased to add the distinction of Significant Sig to the list. "As a pledge, when reading about Significant Sigs like John Wayne, baseball hall of famer Jim Palmer, and hotel icon Bill Marriott, I was in awe to be part of an organization that had them as members," Alan said. "I feel incredibly honored to be recognized by my fraternity for my professional accomplishments and am proud to be a Sigma Chi."

Alan has been married to his sweetheart for 40 years. They have four children, two boys and two girls, and three grandchildren. He enjoys traveling, playing golf and tennis, and music. He even plays in a band with his sons!

A Strong Brotherhood



John Francis "Jon" Connolly '63 entered Chapter Eternal in April 2021 due to complications from Familial Pulmonary Fibrosis. Jon started off his career in advertising and earned many awards throughout his career, including Clio, ANDYS, and ADDY. He also participated in The Rainbow Division of the National Guard in New York City. He was co-writer of *The Dream Team, Eddie, Opportunity Knocks*, as well as "script doctor" for an abundance of other movies. Jon enjoyed mentoring young writers. Jon attended Gettysburg College where he enjoyed playing intramural football, boxing, and was a member of the Sigma Chi Fraternity, which stayed with him his entire life. Jon is survived by his wife, Deborah, his daughter, two grandchildren, his sisters, and countless nieces, nephews, friends, and colleagues who all claim that Jon was the "best friend they ever had."

Robert Zander "Bob" Wagner '61 entered Chapter Eternal on March 28, 2021, in Poquoson, Va. He joined the U.S. Air Force in 1961 and served in the Vietnam War. He served for 21 years as a navigator and F-111 weapons system officer and retired in 1982 with the rank of major. He was recognized for his service and received many awards, including Air Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal, and Distinguished Flying Cross. Bob was devoted to his community and was a member of Christ the King Episcopal Church and Poquoson Lions Club. He also supported charitable groups, including the armed forces, Gettysburg College students and alumni, and wildlife conservation. Bob enjoyed fishing, volunteering, traveling, and attending bible study groups. Bob is survived by his wife of 39 years, Bobbie, three children, a grandson, and several grand-nieces and grand-nephews.
